Local Resident Grateful for Robot-Assisted Surgery at Ridgeview



When a routine colonoscopy revealed a cancerous mass in Russ's body, he was unsure what to expect.

"I was very nervous when I heard something was found," recalled Russ, a Mayer resident. "It was very hard on me but even harder on my wife."

Soon after his cancer diagnosis, Russ and his wife met with Todd Elftmann, MD, Lakeview Clinic.

"He explained the different options for removing the mass, but he highly recommended robot-assisted surgery," Russ remembered.

Introduced to Ridgeview in 2011, the da Vinci* surgical system is used by specially trained surgeons as a minimally invasive alternative to traditional surgery.

The da Vinci system is equipped with robotic arms that make it possible to access hard-to-reach places and allows surgeons to make only a handful of

tiny incisions. The da Vinci system also offers better precision and control for the surgeon and smaller scars for the patient.

Dr. Elftmann explained that recovery times are faster and easier for patients undergoing surgeries with da Vinci; in some cases, recovery time is reduced by half. "Our patients are feeling a lot better, a lot sooner and are experiencing shorter hospital stays than with traditional surgery," Dr. Elftmann said.

Russ was optimistic from the beginning. "I did my research and knew the robot-assisted surgery was my best chance for a surgical cure, and I was very hopeful for a quick recovery," he said.

The day after his procedure, Russ was doing so well that he was able to go home. "Dr. Elftmann told us they were able to remove all of the cancer and that I didn't need chemotherapy or radiation," Russ added. "We are so thankful to Dr. Elftmann and his team for the expert care I received."

Trained Ridgeview surgeons use the da Vinci system for 18 gynecological and urological surgical procedures, and Dr. Elftmann recommends da Vinci whenever possible. "Minimally invasive surgery is the best option for patients, and we can deliver that technology right here at our local hospital," Dr. Elftmann said.

Ridgeview Foundation has launched a campaign to purchase a new version of the da Vinci system, as Ridgeview's current model is being phased out and will no longer be supported. "If we don't purchase the newest device, robotic surgeries will no longer be an option for our patients," Dr. Elftmann explained.

The latest version of da Vinci is equipped with cutting-edge technology that allows surgeons to perform additional procedures, while offering advancements for optimal results.

"He explained the different options for removing the mass, but he highly recommended robot-assisted surgery," Russ said.

By contributing to the da Vinci campaign, donors will help Ridgeview stay on the forefront of robot-assisted medical technology and patient care. Let's work together to create more great cancer-free outcomes for local residents like Russ.


Having just completed the last of Foundation's "Big 3" special events, the 10th Annual Under the Harvest Moon gala on Nov. 23, the Ridgeview community should be filled with holiday cheer. More than \$318,000 was raised in support of the Foundation's latest initiative - the da Vinci® Xi Robotic Surgical System. The new da Vinci will equip Ridgeview surgeons with the latest in robotic surgical technology - Ridgeview has one of the most advanced robotics systems in the United States.

I am also pleased to inform you that the Foundation's last major initiative - the Norman and Ann Hoffman Emergency Center expansion and renovation - is open for business. Phase 1 of construction, the addition of 20,000 square feet of new construction, opened for patients on Nov. 20. The renovation of the existing space started the very next day and is expected to open in the fall of 2020. All told, the new Emergency Center is nearly three times the size of the old facility.

Even more important than the increased size is the level and sophistication of care that can be delivered in the new space. Special accommodations and equipment have been made available for the diagnosis and treatment of older adults and children. In addition, mental health and observation patients have their own "wings" in the new space where they can receive the appropriate level of care.

Of course, all of the Foundation's 2019 success is because of you - the readers of *Foundation Focus*. Last year alone, more than \$3.7 million was transferred to the hospital from the Foundation in support of the aforementioned projects. Where would Ridgeview be without philanthropy ... without you?

Ridgeview opens first completed area of new Norman and Ann Hoffman Emergency Center

As of Nov. 20, 2019, patients in need of emergency care are now being seen in the first completed area of the Norman and Ann Hoffman Emergency Center addition on Ridgeview's Waconia campus.

Work will now begin to remodel the existing emergency department space to tie into the addition, which is expected to be complete in fall of 2020. During this construction, patients will continue to enter the Emergency Department via the entrance on the north side of the hospital building.

The new Phase 1 space includes 12 Emergency Department treatment rooms, two trauma rooms and four rooms specifically designed for behavioral health patients. Other design and technology improvements are providing increased patient and family privacy and improved efficiencies for staff.

The \$18.8 million ED expansion includes 20,000 square feet of additional space and 10,000 square feet of remodel. Included in the addition is space for Cardiac/Pulmonary Rehab on the lower level of the addition, which opened Dec. 9, 2019.





Ridgeview Hospice helped Vern face the day with a smile.

When people asked 84-year-old Vern Brandenburg how he was doing, he would smile and say, "I'm still vertical!" He described himself as a roll-with-the-punches kind of guy, which is why he opted for hospice care instead of further treatment when his cancer returned in January 2019.

Vern passed away in hospice care in September. As a celebration of his life, below are excerpts from an interview with Vern.

Vern had radiation treatment for his initial cancer diagnosis four years ago. When the cancer returned, Vern said, "I knew what radiation was from my first experience. It's not a cure for my diagnosis. It's just elimination of pain, and pain is something I can deal with. I've had too many friends suffer through treatment and die anyway. I don't want to put myself and my family through that again."

Instead, Vern enjoyed the view of Lake Langdon from his cozy Mound apartment and looked forward to frequent visits from a revolving cast of Ridgeview Hospice team members including nurses, home health aides, a chaplain, a massage therapist and a music therapist.

"There's about half a dozen of them," Vern explained. He kept track of their visits in a spiral-bound notebook that sat on his dining room table. He appreciated how their visits made him feel better physically, mentally and spiritually.

"Hospice has made my life livable," Vern said. "It helps me face the day and my neighbors with a smile on my face."

Vern maintained that smile, even though he had to give up driving six months ago. The cancer progressed to make Vern's neck so tight that he could no longer turn his head far enough to look for traffic. He was grateful to his Ridgeview Hospice massage therapist, Gina, for relieving some of that pain and tension during her weekly visits.



When the weather was nice, Vern and his Ridgeview Hospice music therapist, Christian, sat outside on the apartment patio by the lake. Vern would relax and listen while Christian played "Old Rugged Cross" or "Old Shep" on his guitar. Not only was Vern impressed by Christian's knowledge of music, he enjoyed spending time with Christian. "He is so personable, and we talk about a lot of other things besides music," Vern said.

Vern also enjoyed Chaplain Helmar's gift of gab. They read and discussed scriptures during their weekly visits. Chaplain Helmar also inspired Vern to write letters to his children filled with special memories that Vern hoped will ease their grief at his passing. "Helmar is still trying to redeem me," Vern joked. "I enjoy his insights, and I always feel better after his visits."

Ridgeview Hospice helped Vern and so many others cope with end-of-life challenges and fears.

"Hospice adds so much to my daily life," Vern said. "It's hard to measure, but this place makes me feel better. I am not afraid of dying. I can't say I'm looking forward to it, because I've had a good time here, but I accept what is coming."
