Patient Thankful for Emergency Department's Life-Saving Care

Despite a car accident that broke her neck and forced doctors to amputate her left arm, Jessie Krone is filled with gratitude. She's thankful for the skilled team of medical professionals who saved more than her life.

On the morning of July 18, 2016, Krone left her Lester Prairie home to drop her son off at a local football camp and then head to work in Waconia. She took her usual backroad route so she could enjoy the rolling hills and farmland. It was a relaxing drive, but suddenly everything went dark.

"I blacked-out. The last thing I remember is veering over to the side of the road, and I ended up hitting a tree," Krone explained.

When first responders arrived, they found Jessie unresponsive and bleeding extensively, with her left arm trapped in the wreckage. They worked diligently and within minutes were able to extract Jessie using the Jaws of Life. "Jessie was losing a lot of blood and she needed help fast," said Patty Flattery, EMT, Ridgeview Ambulance.

The Emergency Department at Ridgeview was waiting for Jessie and immediately



internal injuries.

As Johnson explored Jessie's abdomen, she found something unexpected. "I saw a heartbeat, I saw a head, I saw a baby," Dr. Johnson recalled. "We were trying to save Jessie's life and realized there's a baby, a baby who isn't doing well."

Because Jessie was unresponsive, no one knew she was seven months pregnant.

filled with additional medical staff to support Jessie and her baby. Mollie was born by C-section seconds later. "Our hospital community came together for Mollie, our little miracle," said Dennis Mohling, MD, Western OB/GYN, A Division of Ridgeview Clinics. The Ridgeview neonatal team was standing ready to take over Mollie's care. "Having the resources in place, we were able to get Mollie guickly stabilized and transported safely to Children's Hospital," says Ellen Bendel-Stenzel, MD, Minnesota Neonatal Physicians, PA.

A New Beginning

Just over a year after her accident, Jessie is finding her new normal. Her quick laugh and easy smile are signs of her gratitude for everyday moments with son Logan and Mollie, Sunday dinners at her parents' farm and the ability to return to work. "Thank you isn't enough," Krone explained, "I could have had nothing, but now I have everything."

Simply log on to www.ridgeviewecare.org and complete the brief online interview by entering your symptoms. Once you complete the process, a Ridgeview Clinic clinician will review and respond with a diagnosis and treatment plan within one hour of Ridgeview's scheduled business hours.

Should you require medication, prescriptions will be sent to your preferred pharmacy for pick-up. If your symptoms indicate an emergent or serious health condition, you will be directed to call 9-1-1 and/or go to the nearest emergency, urgent care or clinic location.

Hours of operation

Ridgeview eCare can be used at any time of day, and Ridgeview providers will respond within one hour between 8 a.m. and 8 pm., Monday-Friday, and 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday-Sunday. Ridgeview's eCare service is not available during holidays; however, customers will be provided information about Ridgeview's Emergency and Urgent Care locations during non-business hours.

Hospice Home Update from Robert Stevens

Didgeview opened the Marie Steiner Kelting Hospice Home in Chaska in 2009—providing a residential hospice care option to hospice patients Nand their families in a home-like setting. The Marie Steiner Kelting Hospice Home is Medicare-certified, and Ridgeview's multidisciplinary team has provided private care, 24 hours a day-including hospice, respite care, symptom management and acute skilled care-to many patients in their final stages of life at this Hospice Home.

Ridgeview has made the very difficult decision to close the Marie Steiner Kelting Hospice Home. There are significant costs to operate a Medicare-certified home, with the costs of care far exceeding the reimbursement-leaving Ridgeview and many other residential hospice homes challenged to close this growing funding gap. This is a substantial financial challenge facing many hospice homes in the state and country, and Ridgeview explored several options before making the decision to close this home.

Ridgeview is actively exploring other uses for the Marie Steiner Kelting Hospice Home building, with the goal to repurpose the home for a current community health need.

Ridgeview will continue to offer its comprehensive, Medicare-certified hospice services to a growing number of patients and families—in their homes, place of residence or hospital setting-in Ridgeview's six-county service area and beyond. Celebrating its 20th year, Ridgeview Hospice has provided nearly 3,900 patients with the highest level of compassionate hospice care since the service began in 1997.
